Periodically I walk through the church for reflection and inspiration. The Serenity Room is still such an inviting place to pause and pray. I love how the room was put together by many loving hands. (Steve Short, George Bashian, Joan Kuster). The church school wing has great props for children's messages and Confirmation games. Room 26 houses the fair supplies and CE Pageant costumes. (There are many baskets if you need one for something). I always stop and look at the bulletin boards and the news clippings of our church members. (Thank you Melva for your articles.) We have new chairs and a love seat in the hallway (thanks to Mary and Peter Clarke) and they are very comfortable. The closet in my old office (second floor conference room) still has props from services, Bible studies etc. I often go to the youth room looking for a lesson that I now do online, and I pause and remember how many youth tried to cram onto one couch.

The ATTIC, is the place to go if you want to know a little church history. Over the years, Rob has cleaned it up and put things in special places marked by seasons. All the way in the back (right turn) are the Christmas decorations. Wreaths are hung up, the lighted manger is in the far back, (purchased by Lucinda Melkonian) as it is usually the last item we need. Russ's manger (because he made it) folds up so it is leaning against the walls. The Christmas trees (thanks to post Christmas specials bought by the Shorts) are neatly boxed up. Garland, lights, ornaments, wrapped gift boxes (for a pageant), and the 12 days of Christmas posters (created by Jill Emmer) are all in that area. Another area has on a shelf the Thanksgiving Trees from the Zawacki family (I still remember the story he shared about his first wife's car wreck on Thanksgiving returning from riding her horse). We have wheelchairs, walkers, shower chairs, canes from people who no longer need them. I used to get calls late in the afternoon asking if we are the church with the crutches. I would leave them by the door for whoever needed them. Tents (gifted by the Cohn family) from past adventure trips, are toward the back alongside the box of props from the Women's Auxiliary when they used to have the Live Nativity Program. Sue Bashian and Nancy Faye would create an elaborate program and script showing Madonna paintings from museums all over the world, then church women would be poised in the same scene live on stage. Ruby Gustavson would help with make-up and getting the scene just right. We have a box of stuffed toys from Albert Chu that we would give out at various times, a Marty Lyons framed picture and a few golf shirts. Banners from Confirmation and church school (some have definitely seen better days) and the church's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary banner is still there along with the ones hung on Stewart Avenue leading up to the celebration. Another room houses candelabras that we bring out for Tenebrae Services. Stretched out are the characters Margie used Christmas Eve. They have been lying around for years. They came to life at the 4:30 pm Family Christmas Service. Originally created by Jane Huber, Margie added to the collection. Of course, there are old files and records that are not the least bit interesting, but necessary. This is what I do when I am alone in the building missing you. I find you in the hidden places around the church. I remember how each of you have made a contribution over the years to the life of our church. I look forward to rummaging through the church with you soon. In the meantime, What's in Your Attic?

Greetings fellow Church Members!

On behalf of myself and the Council of Trustees I would like to thank Reverend Lynn Sullivan and the Worship team for embarking on this deeply meaningful, and final phase of our Church's reopening plan that completed the year with a beautiful series of Advent and Christmas Services. Reverend Sullivan has been flexible, creative and committed while ensuring we accomplish this safely and responsibly. We are especially grateful for Ms. Margie Price for a beautiful Family Christmas Eve service on the front Lawn of our Church.

Over the course of the past few months, our internal attendance management and contact tracing process has been successful in that when we have been notified of individuals of possible Covid19 exposure situations, we have been able to quickly notify any that may have been in proximate contact. Thus far we have avoided any known situations within our building requiring closure.

I continue to emphasize that while our Building is re-opened on a Limited (but inviting) basis, please be mindful and respect that the Church Office is making a great effort to maintain a staggered, reduced capacity safe environment for our Members, our School Students, and our Building Renters. In addition to the regular weekly team of Steve Short, Doug Yasso, Mark Sullivan and Joe Rivera, Hugh Lacy and Brad Gustafson have been instrumental in navigating Building Plans and Improvements in a thoughtful fashion, upgrading our Building and enhancing our Congregational experience. Hugh has taken some time to answer some questions about the current and future improvements, listed on page 2. F&A and COT have been reviewing and assessing plans from our contracted Building Engineer and have moved forward with the items we deemed most pressing. In addition to addressing HVAC safety with respect to our current pandemic, we are also taking the opportunity to bring various parts of the building up to current building standard Safety Codes.

As I stated in November, we believe we are reopening in the most responsible fashion within our power, and we continue to work extremely hard on improving the buildings general environment for our Church Members usage. As a reminder, we have initiated:

- a. Upgrading existing technology to accommodate registration and scheduling.
- b. Installation of barriers in key areas.
- c. Improved air circulation throughout key areas of the Building.
- d. Addition of Ultra-Violet (UVC) lights to Sanctuary Air Handlers.



# Garden City Community Church Awarded a \$50,000 Grant

The Garden City Community Church was awarded a grant through the 2020 Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program. This will fund Rev. Lynn Sullivan's sabbatical, and create programs at the church in her absence. Committee work has begun to plan for Rev. Lynn's sabbatical starting in May.

During her absence, the Church intends to invite clergy from the diverse NY Metro Association to lead worships services. The Church will encourage these ministers to include musical, liturgical dance, and other elements of worship in the services they lead with a goal of discerning how different types of worship connect with people in ways beyond our current experience. The Church will enhance its Vacation Bible School program (or launch a new comparable program), which currently includes church members and folks from neighboring communities, to connect in new ways and increase connections to a broader community. The Church will add and enhance music, drama and other offerings directed at expanding the families that join us. During the sabbatical, the Church will also invite the General Minister and President of United Church of Christ to share with the Church ways churches can strengthen and expand connections in a changing world. The connections between the Congregation and Lynn's sabbatical will be reinforced through a church-wide dinner after she returns at which she will share some of the learnings and new ideas that came out of her sabbatical and the Church will share its experiences, challenges and growth during her absence.

## WEDNESDAY NIGHT LENTEN SERIES

## **CONVERSATIONS ABOUT FAITHFUL CONNECTIONS**

Following the Ash Wednesday service on February 17, the Church will offer a four-week Wednesday Night Lenten Series featuring **Conversations about Faithful Connections**. On February 24 and each of March 3, 10 and 17 at 8:00 p.m., Zoom sessions facilitated by George Bashian and Paul Cohn will meet to explore several of the needs and challenges of staying connected during these times of pandemic, political change, economic uncertainty and personal, family and community stress and anxiety.

The first session will invite conversations about some of the Biblical roots of connectedness and their relevance to us today. The second session will explore how to stay connected within a faith community and the different ways in which to be connected. The third will invite reflections and ideas about what we learned about connectedness during the COVID pandemic, including mistakes made, lessons earned and new strategies for coping in times of broken connections. The last will focus on looking and moving forward to deepen our faith connections.

Although George and Paul will provide Biblical seeds for discussion and related topics and challenges for contemplation, the series endeavors to invite folks from all of the settings of the Church to begin meaningful conversations about where we are spiritually, personally, as families and as a community of faith. The conversations are open to all church members, friends and families, and no books, preparation or written materials will be needed. Open hearts, open minds and a desire to connect with God and each other are the only requirements to join in the conversation. If you have questions or matters on the topic that are dear to you and you would like to be presented to the group, let George or Paul know ahead of time (or raise at a meeting) and we will endeavor to bring before the group. If you would like to join George and Paul in facilitating any session or discussion of any particular area on topic, please let them know and you will be given an opportunity to do so, time permitting.

Our Profile was submitted to the UCC and other pastoral posting sites at the beginning of January. The next step is to locate potential candidates, and follow our church's criteria to make our recommendation(s) to the congregation.

Once an appropriate candidate has been carefully and prayerfully identified by the Search Committee, the congregation will vote on the recommendation (a 2/3 vote is required).

We are excited to begin this new step of the Search and Call process and look forward to bringing a candidate recommendation to the congregation, in the near future.

A Counselor Shares Her Personal Devotion: COVID And 'Getting Bigger' By: Elizabeth Geiling, MSED, LMHC, LCC Counselor



As I think back on this past year, the word that keeps coming to my mind is unsettled. We don't know what the future holds for our nation, our health, our career and our family. To date, I have never experienced anything like this where all parts of my life are uncertain. We are in a pattern of waiting. We are in the psychological space of limbo, which is one of the most demanding states, requiring a lot of emotional energy, before we even get to the required work of the day. We are unsettled, uncertain and often afraid of what is coming next.

My son is a hardcore climber. He has climbed all over the world, Argentina, Bolivia, Peru, and he summited Mt. Rainer. Recently, he had an accident; not at all related to his dangerous journeys. He was moving a stove and it slipped down the stairs, with him staying almost ahead of it. We received the phone call (in November) that could be any parent's call, but, indeed every parent's worst nightmare.

"Your son has been hurt..." As I listen and try to take the details in, the irony does not escape me. An oven, a random accident has almost taken this kid out of the game permanently. It seems a bit unfair to the worrier and the mom in me, because I had preemptively imagined many horrific types of accidents and none of them included a major appliance

10 days in the hospital and 3 surgeries to wait through gave me a lot of time to ponder life! I would like to share an experience that happened in the hospital, or as my mother-in law would call it, a "God Wink":

I am sitting by the hospital bed of my 23 year old son, who has been seriously injured. Bones broken, limbs crushed and he is scared and confused. I search every part of his face and I can see the baby, the child, the teen. He is bigger now, a grown man, but, I have loved this face and body from before our eyes met.

Time has passed so quickly, but these hours at the bedside feel endless. I feel my body breaking, as I take in the scope of his injuries. My mind moves through the memories of the care I have provided. He is hurt and no amount of 'mommy' can fix this now. Soon, the hospital waiting game begins, as the surgeries are performed and we will the hours to pass.

Directly in front of us in the family waiting area is the hospital gift shop and while we wait, we memorize the contents in the window. Off to the left, there is a circular rack that contains all types of stuffed bears. Laying across the top, staring right at us is a stuffed bear that is almost an exact copy of the one we bought him on the day he was born. It is a little bigger than the original.

As it often happens in tense situations, our family erupts with laughter when the realization hits. Because along the way, Luke lost baby bear and it was a memorable heartbreak. As a child he would wonder where he might be, search the campus we lived on absolutely sure he left it here or there. At night, he would keep his brother awake suggesting other possible locations. We never found baby bear.

Finally, we are called on the phone. He is through the surgery and we are able to see him. He is in that post surgical sleep, between consciousness and unconsciousness and I sit by his bed. He wakes a little and I hand him the newly purchased baby bear, he cuddles up to it and says, "I have been looking for you for a long time. You are a little bigger now." His recollection, a simple, pure memory of something he loved deeply and never stopped looking for is a profound spiritual message to me (My "God Wink").

I am overwhelmed by presence of the Holy, reminding me that amidst all this brokenness and uncertainty, I am being held in love and God is always looking for me. I am calm for the first time since this ordeal began. I feel we are at another beginning, baby bear in tow and that our family will emerge from this 'bigger'. We will know more, we will understand more, we will have more empathy and we will know God is here holding us in the journey.

I am aware that many of you are experiencing difficult times and the waiting and uncertainty is draining. I am inviting you in these scary, uncertain, sacred moments of your lives to keep your heart open to the "God-Wink" that says – "I am the God of ages past, present and future. I've got you. I am always looking for you"

When we cannot predict an outcome, when we are in limbo, while we are waiting, know that God is there too. We pray that we will emerge bigger with a greater capacity for love and service. Amen
